Drawing Scale Plans and Sections

Every drawing must include:

Site name

As with all records, these are added to each drawing so that the Site code

records from one site can be distinguished from another.

SMR number

asked.

Date Is important so that if a series of drawings is made of one feature or

area it is easy to work out which drawing was made first.

Title of the drawing Helps to identify the drawing easily.

Drawing scale The scale of the drawing needs to be known so that accurate details

can be taken from it.

Context numbers

These help to identify the archaeology recorded on the drawing and where necessary notes will clarify details about individual contexts, or

where necessary notes will clarify details about individual contexts, or will give details about the archaeology or drawing which are difficult to

represent clearly in a drawing.

Level of the datum The fixed points of the levels will locate the drawings vertically within

the archaeological excavation. See also the relevant sections above

and below.

Datum nails The fixed points of grid pegs and co-ordinates or datum nails will locate

the drawings horizontally within the archaeological excavation. See

Grid pegs & co-ordinates also the relevant sections above and below.

Cardinal points, i.e. north, south,

east, west, etc.

Levels across the plan

or

North indicator

These will relate the drawing to north so that the orientation of features

can be determined.

Each drawing must also be entered on the Drawings Register:

Drawing Number The next consecutive number on the list.

Sheet Number The number of the sheet that the new drawing will be made on or, if the sheet is a new

one, the next consecutive sheet number.

Plan / Section Whether the drawing is a plan, section drawing, or elevation drawing.

Description A very brief description of what the drawing shows, e.g. Plan of Area A or North-facing

section of Cut 5006.

Scale The scale of the drawing, e.g. 1:10 or 1:20.

Date & Name Write your name and the date so that if there are any queries or questions your

supervisor can get back to you.
